The Epiphany Proclamation

Although calendars now give the date of Easter and the other feasts in the liturgical year for many years in advance, the Epiphany proclamation still has value. It is a reminder of the centrality of the resurrection of the Lord in the liturgical year and the importance of the great mysteries of faith which are celebrated each year.

*Dear brothers and sisters,
The glory of the Lord has shone upon us,
and shall ever be manifest among us,
until the day of his return.*

*Through the rhythms of times and seasons
let us celebrate the mysteries of salvation.
Let us recall the year's culmination,
the Easter Triduum of the Lord:
his last supper, his crucifixion,
his burial, and his rising,
celebrated between the evening of the ninth of April
and the evening of the twelfth of April.*

*Each Easter as on each Sunday
the Holy Church makes present
the great and saving deed by which Christ has
forever conquered sin and death.*

From Easter are reckoned all the days we keep holy.

*Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent,
will occur on the twenty-fifth of February.
The Ascension of the Lord will be commemorated
on the twenty-fourth of May.
Pentecost, the joyful conclusion of the season of Easter,
will be celebrated on the thirty-first of May.
And this year the First Sunday of Advent
will be on the twenty-ninth of November.*

*Likewise the pilgrim Church proclaims
the Passover of Christ in the feasts of the
Holy Mother of God, in the feasts of the Apostles and Saints,
and in the commemoration of the faithful departed.*

*To Jesus Christ, who was, who is, and who is to come,
Lord of time and history,
Be endless praise, for ever and ever.*

*Now that so many wishes have been granted with the Christmas gifts we have received, perhaps we should take a moment to treasure what is most important as we resolve to begin the new year with a better perspective. The following article by Kathy Coffey, author of *The Art of Faith*, seems to say it all . . .*

How Much is Enough?

How many of us waste precious time and energy ogling "what we can't have," or figuring out a way to get it? In doing so, we overlook the great goods we do have: the endless reservoir of God's love, the gifts of family and friends, the beauty of creation, a warm pool of memories, individual talents, health, the support of a faith community.

We've all had the experience of yearning for something that we thought would bring happiness: the child's bike, the teenager's car, the adult's antique. Getting the object might thrill us temporarily, and we might even cherish it for some time. But eventually, the bike gets outgrown, the car dies, and the antique, grown dusty and dull, joins the junk pile. No *thing* can provide the long-term happiness for which we were created.

Most people who accumulate find that one thing leads to another. And on it goes, until we don't realize we're caught up in an unending cycle. We work hard to afford storage lockers for stuff we don't even use. Then we wonder why we're not at peace. The ecological footprint left by us is gigantic — we're destroying the planet's resources with our greed.

The trouble with envy is, it never ends. If we use the latest gizmos to shore up a weak ego or impress our friends, we're in big trouble, caught in a long quest for more. Nothing wrong with the gadget — the problem lies within if we can't believe we're enough: fashioned by God, redeemed by Christ, invigorated by the Spirit, intimately loved by the Trinity and precious to some fine human beings. What else do we need?

As the end of life approaches, do we want to cling stubbornly to possessions which probably won't fit into the casket? Or will we be ready to ease joyfully into God's arms because we've been there all along?

Having more is never enough.

Light of the World

Today is a feast of light! Images of light surround us in today's liturgy. In fact, the meaning of the word *epiphany* means "revelation" or "illumination." What was once darkness is now light; what was once hidden is now revealed.

Christ, the Light of God, has come into the world. John's Gospel tells us that "the darkness has not overcome [the light] (1:5). Indeed, that is what today's solemnity acknowledges and celebrates: that God's Light has come into the world and has overpowered the darkness; that God, through Christ, has literally *transformed* the darkness into light!

Today's celebration gives us hope! The darkness that exists in the world is all too real: darkness of war, of terrorism; darkness of an increasing disregard for human life; darkness of oppression and of violence. Sometimes the darkness is strong and it threatens to actually overcome the Light that is Christ, the Light that is his Gospel, the Light that is God's love. *But*, we have a promise from God and today we remember that promise: The darkness will *never* overcome the Light! Today we proclaim that God shines upon us and, in his love, his glory will always appear over us (see Isaiah 60:2)!

The Epiphany of the Lord *Ephesians 3:2—3a, 5-6*

The birth of Jesus became the worst kept secret in the history of the world. All along, people knew God had a plan. God had told everyone from Adam and Eve, to Abraham and Sara, to Moses and Miriam, to David and Bathsheba, to Hosea and Gomer, to Mary and Joseph that there was a plan. Nobody fully understood it. Nobody knew how God would bring the plan to fulfillment, but they all believed. They had seen God work mighty deeds in their lives, and they believed that one day the promise of redemption would be fulfilled.

Jesus was God's secret. When Jesus was born in humble surroundings outside of royalty and pageantry, only a handful of people even began to realize what God had done.

But the secret got out. Angels appeared in the sky. Shepherds showed up. Magi traveled from faraway land. Everyone was finding out God's two great surprises: Jesus was born as the promised Messiah, and he came not just for his own race, but for all the people of the world.

The letter to the Ephesians says, God's mystery "was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit." Jesus was born, and he came to save each of us, no matter what family we came from, what we believed, or how we behaved. The mystery of God's love is open now to the whole world. That is the epiphany, the revelation of God's secret.
